Senior Jon Paul DeSario has known Lorusso throughout high school. DeSario has played football for Lorusso for two years, been a student of him in the classroom, and gotten to know him very well as a person.

Lorusso has built up his impressive reputation as a compassionate, dedicated person by coaching the varsity football team, and by teaching at Roxbury for many years. In 2009, Lorusso led his football team to a state championship, and he is looking to do the same this year with one of the most talented teams he has ever coached.

The National Honor Society class of 2012 elected Lorusso to be the keynote speaker at the prestigious induction ceremony. Lorusso is married and is the proud father of four daughters, whom often appear at the games that he coaches. Despite being such an iconic character at Roxbury, Lorusso has his fatherly instinct and he puts his family before anything else.

"He's such a great guy on so many levels, on the field and in the classroom," DeSario said. I've become very close with him and he has changed me as a person for the better."
